Co. Ltd., plant at Waukegan, Illinois, a wholly owned subsidiary of the Western Television Corporation. Moreover this receiver is manufactured so that it retails at less than \$100.00 and the Echophone Radio Mfg. Co. Ltd., is the first to build the so-called model of the midget radio receiving set.

From time to time during the year you will receive from your company letters or bulletins showing its progress, and in the meantime if you are interested in the technical side of television we invite your correspondence.

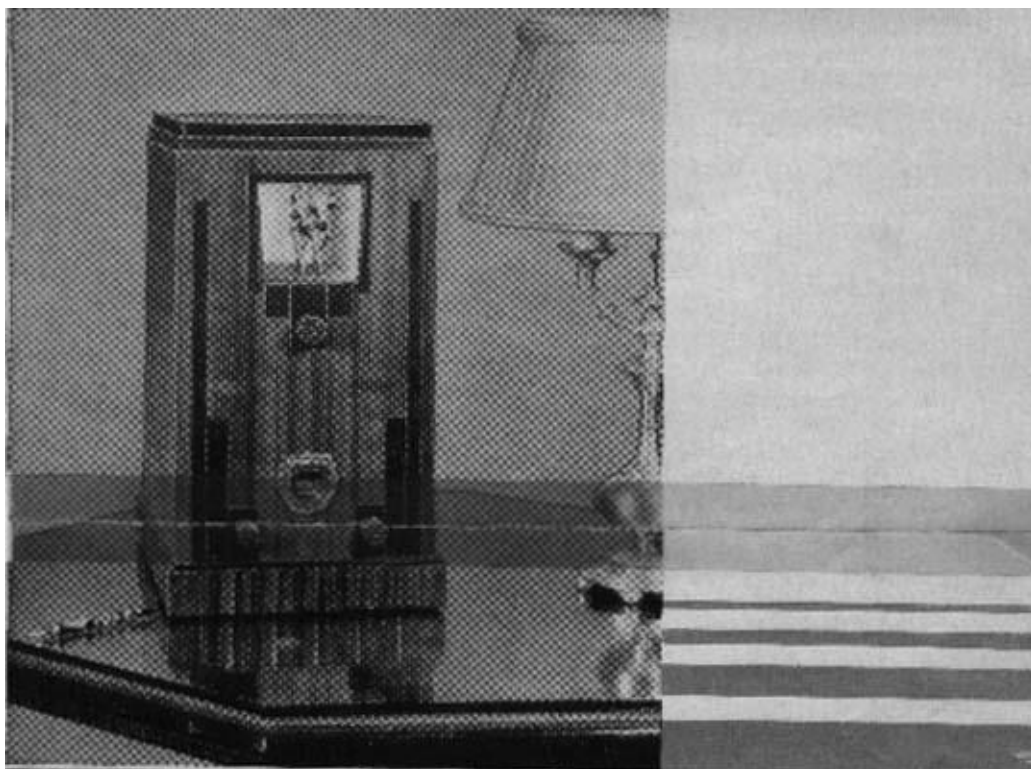

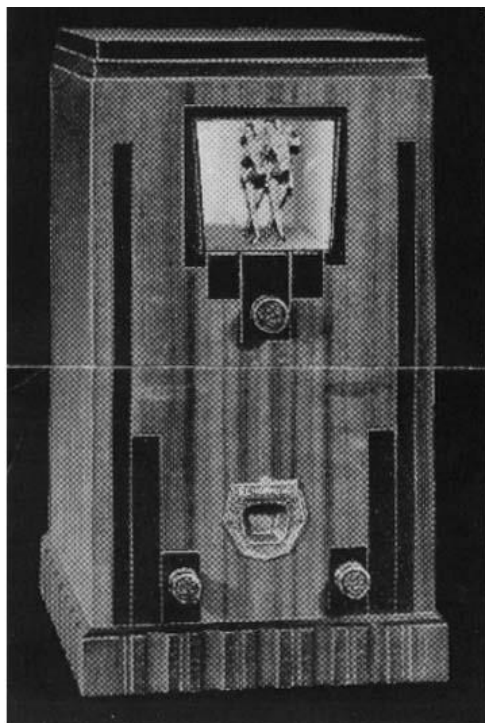

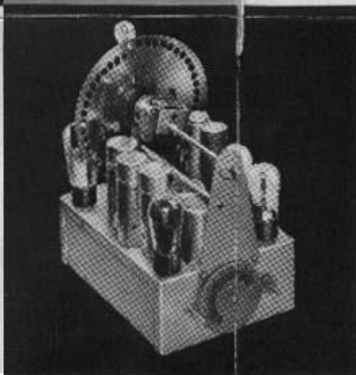

This long-awaited television receiver is made possible by an exclusive Echophone development of the hot cathode type crater lamp. A forty-five hole, three spiral lens disc of absolute accuracy is driven at a rate of 15 revolutions per second by a newly designed sub-synchronous type motor, which enables a self-starting compact television unit of unusually quiet operation.

The scanner mechanism is mounted on the 8-tube superheterodyne chassis which is especially designed to combine the sensitivity and perfect fidelity so necessary for fine television reception. Standard tubes are used in this circuit which provides three stages of tuned radio frequency, a diode detector and three stages of resistance-coupled audio amplification. Tubes are easily accessible through sliding top of the cabinet.
