

WESTINGHOUSE PLANS UNITS FOR COLOR TV

The Westinghouse Electric Corporation notified its television distributors yesterday that it intended to make available adapters and converters so that its present black-and-white receivers could receive color programs in the future.

The corporation, which is one of the major set manufacturers, emphasized that it believed that the popular TV programs of today would continue to be seen in black-and-white for an indefinite period.

The Vim and Dynamic chain stores, which on Tuesday revealed that they would offer written guarantees that their sets could be converted to color, noted yesterday that their service would not be limited to the color transmission method of the Columbia Broadcasting System, which has won Federal approval.

The same service also would be offered in the event of future approval of the system of the Radio Corporation of America, they said.

The Sightmaster Corporation, a set manufacturer, in a suit filed in Supreme Court, asked \$750,000 in damages from C. B. S. on the basis of the network's suggestion that the public might save money if it waited six months for a complete, factory-built color receiver. The corporation charged that the suggestion injured its business.
